Message from the Superintendent

I wish to thank all of you for your hard work in getting the 2013-2014 school year off to a smooth start. Except for the normal first day traffic congestion, we had a nearly perfect start to the new school year!

It appears that we will have a significant gain in enrollment for the second year in a row. Our first day enrollment count was up 264 students as compared to the first day of the previous year. We enrolled an additional 48 students the second day. The largest enrollment gains were at Handin-Hand and Garrison-Pilcher, but we saw growth across the entire system. I appreciate the patience of our teachers, students, and staff as we work to balance class loads and adjust class rosters. I anticipate that at least two additional teaching positions will be added to help cover growth.

This year promises to be both exciting and challenging. We will implement the Teacher Keys Evaluation System and the Leader Keys Evaluation System in every school, and our system will have its three-year visit for re-accreditation by the Georgia Accrediting Commission. Our MERIT program enters its second year. During the program's first year, we saw record academic achievements from our students and a greater diversity of students completing honors and accelerated course work than

ever before. I expect to see even greater achievements this year. Last year, we significantly increased the number of gifted and high achieving students enrolled and being served in our system, we increased the number of middle school students earning high school credits, and the number of high school students earning college credits.

Our new middle school career-science center will open this fall and will offer the most comprehensive exploratory course options for middle school students in our area of the state. We are entering the second year of a

three-year plan to enhance the implementation of adaptive technology for special needs students.

The Thomas County School System has an academic program to meet the needs of every student, and career and extra-curricular options to cultivate talents and hone skills in virtually every interest area.

I hope that you have a great year. Please let me know if I can help you in any way.

Strategic Planning Process for TC Schools

In March of 2013, the Thomas County School System (TCSS) began the Strategic Planning process with a Community Engagement Meeting where several hundred people had the opportunity to share their thoughts and ideas on the future of the system. A follow-up survey gave people who were not able to attend the meeting an opportunity to provide input as well.

Feedback was gathered from the following questions:

- 1. To become the best school district in the country, what should the TCSS preserve/keep?
- 2. To become the best School District in the country, what should the TCSS change/ get rid of/do differently?
- 3. What do you think are the top challenges faced by the TCSS?

- 4. What do you think are the top challenges faced by the students in the TCSS?
- 5. As a community, what do we want our public schools to provide for our students?

Then on June 17 and 18, parents, community members, school system partners, teachers, administrators, students, and board members met and worked as a Strategic Planning Team to set goals and priorities that will guide the district for the next five years.

Within the next month or so, small focused groups will meet as Academic, Continuous Improvement, Learning Environment, Operational, and Parent Involvement Teams in order to complete the framework and develop a plan that will guide and shape the direction of the Thomas County School System for the next five years.

Teaching and Learning in the Thomas County School System

On July 22, 2013, State School Superintendent Dr. John Barge and Gov. Nathan Deal announced that Georgia was withdrawing from the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) test development consortium.

As Georgia builds new assessments, the assessments:

- will be aligned to the math and English language arts state standards;
- will be high-quality and rigorous;
- will be developed for students in grades 3 through 8 and high school;
- will be reviewed by Georgia teachers;
- will require less time to administer than the PARCC assessments;
- will be offered in both computer- and paper-based formats; and
- will include a variety of item types, such as performance-based and multiple-choice.

As a system, our summer professional learning


calendar focused on the alignment of K-12 writing, literacy in the academic disciplines, and the use of DOK (Depth of Knowledge) question stems. As we work this year to align our benchmarks to the Common Core Georgia Performance Standards, it will be important to include a variety of item types that will be of high quality and rigorous within each newly aligned benchmark. As you familiarize yourself with the types of questions and use the DOK question stems, it will be important to scaffold your students in their daily instruction by using the DOK question stems in class discussions as well as in weekly assignments.

As educators, we wear many hats and twirl lots of plates at one time leaving us with no time to waste. I encourage you to make use of the new TRL (Teacher Resource Link) that can be found within the SLDS. You will find excellent teaching tools and resources that align to all of the standards at your fingertips without wasting

precious time searching for resources for your lessons.

remaining administrators will be trained during the week of August 19-23 by a team of GaDoe evaluation specialists in the PLC at the Thomas County Board of Education.

Next week, we begin administering screeners in grades K-8 as part of our system's progress monitoring process. Please study and analyze the data that you collect and use it to guide your daily instruction. We used the data collected from the yearly screeners from last year and reported it as one of the CCRPI indicators known as Innovative Practices for our school system this year.

Last year at this time, I shared my thoughts on the Pathway to the Common Core and how the difficulty seemed to be more in the understanding of the Pathway than with the standards. This year, as we complete the Strategic Plan that will guide our system for the next five years, it is evident that we have created a successful college or career pathway for all students in the Thomas County School System.


