



Envision Grant Helps Students "Bee'come" Their Best

Envision Credit Union recently awarded a \$2,000 grant to Hand-In-Hand Primary School "to help students become their best versions of themselves."

Funds from the grant will be used to purchase supplies for a Conscious Discipline program the school has been implementing.
Hand-in-Hand Counselor Whitney Robertson applied for the grant with hopes of enhancing a child's emotional development by strengthening the skills of both students and staff, all of which have a profound effect on school climate and learning.

The benefits of Robertson's project, entitled "'Bee'coming Our Best Through Social Emotional Learning," will be carried into a child's future years of school by helping students become successful students and citizens.

Robertson said, "As

the Hand-In-Hand School Counselor, I am working to grow our staff in knowledge, understanding, and scrupulous practice of the Conscious Discipline powers of self-control and skills of self-discipline in order to become more emotionally regulated adults. In turn, these adults can teach the necessary skills of selfregulation to children in order to enhance social, emotional, and academic learning."

The \$2,000 will purchase supplies such as self-regulation toolkits which students can use to help label and manage their emotions, language literacy packs to help develop social and emotional skills and "greeting aprons" to help sent the tone for a positive day of learning.

"If a child can do advanced math, speak three languages or make top grades, but they can't handle their emotions, then none of the other stuff really matters," Robertson said. "That's why this is so important to us."

Robertson plans to also develop six "calm-down" centers in each of Hand-In-Hand's hallways to provide a safe place for students to work through their emotions.

"It is hard for a student to learn to read and write if they can't regulate how they feel," Robertson added. "This has a vertical progression which, if continued, will one day help these individuals enter the workforce with the ability to learn financial literacy, use technology, and serve their community. Ultimately, children and teachers will have an opportunity to learn new skills that will help alleviate conflicts and contribute to improved mental health which will prove beneficial in and to our community."

Envision has been instrumental in improving education through grants to local schools. The credit union has donated more than \$60,000 in classroom grants since the program's inception, and teachers from Thomas County Schools have been fortunate to benefit from Envision's commitment to education.



REACH SCHOLARSHIPS AWARDED - Five Thomas County Middle School (TCMS) students recently signed to be part of the Realizing Educational Achievement Can Happen (REACH) Georgia program, a needs-based scholarship designed to promote academic success and expand access to higher education. Students signed contracts to agree to meet attendance and behavior requirements, maintain a certain grade point average, participate in REACH related activities, and meet weekly with a mentor. Their parents or guardians also signed contracts to support their student through their education. Upon graduation from high school, the scholars will receive up to \$10,000 to be used at a HOPE eligible Georgia two or four-year college. Thomas County Middle School Assistant Principal Todd Creech received the 2019 Hal Beaver Georgia Outstanding Assistant Principal Award at the annual GAESP/GAMSP Fall Conference on November 3.

The award's namesake, Mr. Hal Beaver, was a long time Georgia elementary principal and a past National Distinguished Principal. He started and conducts the GAEL Aspiring Principals Program and has helped to develop many outstanding assistant principals in the state through his leadership.

Creech was nominated for the award by Dr. Bob Heaberlin, Executive Director for The Georgia Association of Middle School Principals.

"Todd has demonstrated the leadership skills as an assistant principal at Thomas County Middle School that exemplifies the best of Georgia's administrators," Dr. Heaberlin said. As an assistant principal, he not only has to be an instructional leader, but must also provide for the safety of students, faculty, and staff. In addition, he works with maintenance and custodial staff to ensure a properly maintained facility. Mr. Creech's actions have demonstrated his compassion for the TCMS staff, students, and community. He has also worked with other colleagues in his district to help grow the Georgia Association of Middle School Principals."

A product of the Thomas County School System, Creech has served as assistant principal at Thomas County Middle School for four years.

"I'm honored to be recognized by my colleagues," Creech said. "It is a privilege to accept an award from an organization that promotes high professional standards and to be acknowledged for my leadership skills."

Creech was one of the five honored for this award from across the state of Georgia.

County Bus Drivers Learn CPR

Marion Jackson has been driving a school bus in Thomas County for five years. While she has never had a medical emergency on any of her buses, she feels confident in her ability to perform CPR on a student in need.

Jackson attended a CPR training session recently taught by nurses in the Thomas County School System. She walked out of the session feeling confident.

The training allows for bus drivers "to have a good start" on knowing CPR, Jackson said.

Dr. Scott James, Associate

Superintendent for Student Services, who oversees the transportation department, said he wants bus drivers to have CPR training and awareness as well as comfort in administering it.

Bus drivers have between 50-70 children on their buses during routes, Dr. James said.

Last year, the fire department trained bus drivers in Stop the Bleed, a national awareness campaign that encourages bystanders to become trained to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives.



Erin Rehberg, Digital Learning Coordinator for Thomas County Schools, has


been awarded the Flanders Scholarship which is given annually to a member of the Georgia Association of Curriculum and Instructional Supervisors (GACIS) who is pursuing a


