NOTE: Students have many options to ENTER and EXIT from their academic studies into the workforce. When a student graduates from high school, they are eligible to choose one of many ENTRANCE POINT options: 1. Enroll in either a 2- or 4-year post-secondary program; 2. Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; or 3. Enter the workforce using technical skills learned in high school. When a student finishes a 2- or 4-year degree program, they may choose to EXIT and 1. Enroll in an apprenticeship program or the military; 2. Enroll in a professional university degree program; or 3. Enter the workforce using technical skills learned.

Veterinary Science Career Pathway Completers - Industry Credentialing for High School Students

Upon completion of sequenced courses in a Veterinary Science Career Pathway, students are eligible to complete the Industry-Recognized student credential for fulfillment of the End of Pathway Assessment. Secondary students completing the Veterinary Science pathway will be able to sit for the National Industry Credentialed assessment offered on-line from Precision. Once mastery is reached, students will receive recognition for completion and use this credential in conjunction with their job or continuing training.

*Veterinary Science is recommended for student who earned a B or higher in Animal Science and Biotechnology.

Georgia offers a dual credit program titled Dual Enrollment. You need to talk with your parents, school counselor, or advisor about the proper courses to take each year in high school and dual credit. Students completing the course work in this Plan, will have earned/completed an Industry Credential, Technical Certificate of Credit (TCC), Associates of Applied Science Degree, and/or Bachelor's Degree.

Postsecondary Transition

- Students who will continue their education in a Program of Study at one of the University System of Georgia institutions should prepare to take the ACT or SAT for admissions. Tests for admissions may vary from institution to institution. Contact the selected institution for specific testing information. - Students who will continue their education in a Program of Study at one of the Technical College System of Georgia institutions should prepare to complete a placement exam.
- Students who will continue their education and training in the US Military should take the ASVAB assessment. ٠
- Students should utilize electronic college and career databases to select the most appropriate postsecondary opportunities to match their selected career field, including registered apprenticeships.
- Georgia's dual-credit programs have been combined into one program entitled Dual Enrollment, in which high school students may earn their high school course credits while taking college courses.

Veterinary Science Systems Pathway Description

Veterinarians treat health problems of pets, livestock, and animals in zoos, racetracks, and laboratories. They are concerned with preventing, controlling, and curing animal diseases as well as researching human and animal health to develop new ways to prevent and cure diseases. Some veterinarians are meat inspectors, and others work in wildlife management.

The American Medical Veterinary Association reports that about 70 percent of veterinarians work in private medical practices treating small animals. Almost one-fourth of all veterinarians work in "mixed" practices, treating pigs, goats, cattle, and sheep in addition to companion pets. A small number of veterinarians treat large animals (horses or cattle) exclusively. These veterinarians drive to farms or ranches to provide services for herds or individual animals. Veterinarians involved in food safety and inspection check livestock for diseases that may be transmitted to human beings. They advise owners on the treatment of their animals as well as ordering guarantines when necessary. They may also inspect slaughtering and processing plants and enforce federal regulations concerning food purity and sanitation.
