For Mexicans, food is central to their culture, the key to their whole history.

As a preview of learning about this celebration, I will be showing *Food for the Ancestors*. This video, from PBS, is an insightful look into one of Mexico's most elaborate and mysterious festivals. The program explores traditions and ancient ways of life that continue today, interpreted through Mexican cuisine, which is far different from North American tacos and salsa.
